Registration

If you are a **current or previous member** of the MMLA, you have received an invitation from our new membership portal, MemberClicks, which will prompt you to log in and set up your password. Once completed, you will be prompted to renew your membership (if necessary).

If you did not receive an invitation from our membership portal, MemberClicks, you can **become a member** of the MMLA by creating an account on <u>our new website</u>. In doing so, you will be prompted to complete a member profile and pay for a one-year membership online.
