Virtual Sessions

Unlike in years previous, no virtual or hybrid sessions are scheduled for the 2026 Convention.

General Panel Structure

For MMLA's 2026 Convention, panels with four presenters have been scheduled for hour-and-a-half sessions, which allots each panelist up to fifteen minutes to present their work before a thirty-minute, collective Q&A. Panels with three or two presenters are scheduled for hour-and-fifteen-minute sessions, providing each panelist with fifteen minutes (or, in the case of the latter, twenty minutes) to present their work before the collective Q&A portion.

Professionalizing Sessions

Presenters will discuss their own experience and what they have found particularly helpful along the way. Sessions are between an hour and fifteen and an hour and a half in length, permitting each presenter to speak before addressing questions from the audience for the remainder of the time.

Because of shared disciplinary interests, the MMLA annually provides time and meeting space during its convention for panels of organizations referred to in the program as an “Associated Organization.” These panels are open to all who are registered for the MMLA Convention and display an identification badge.

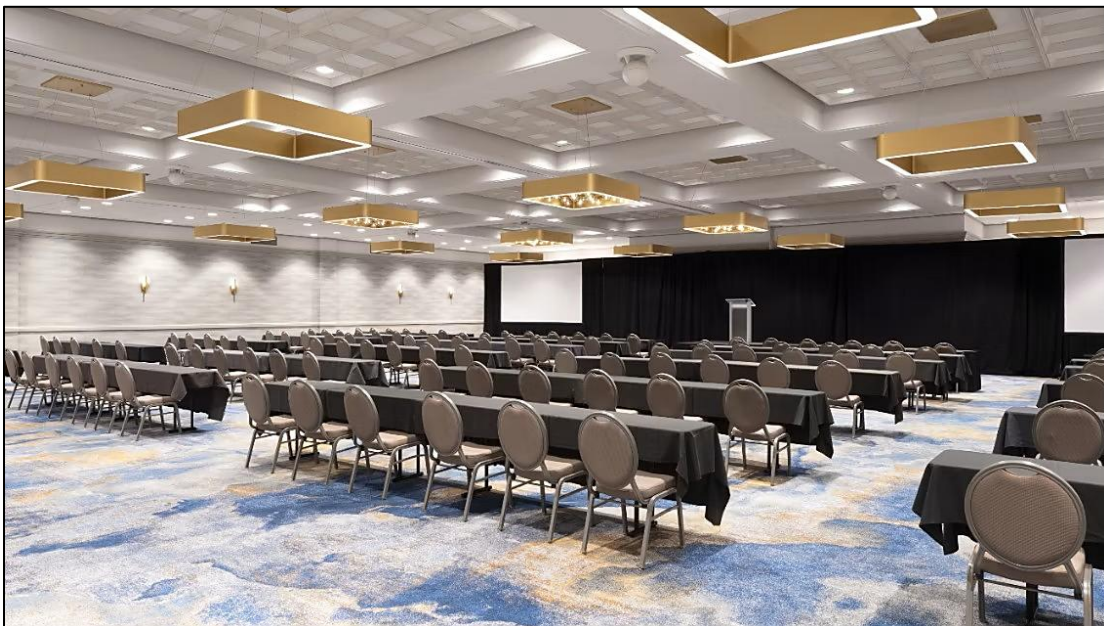

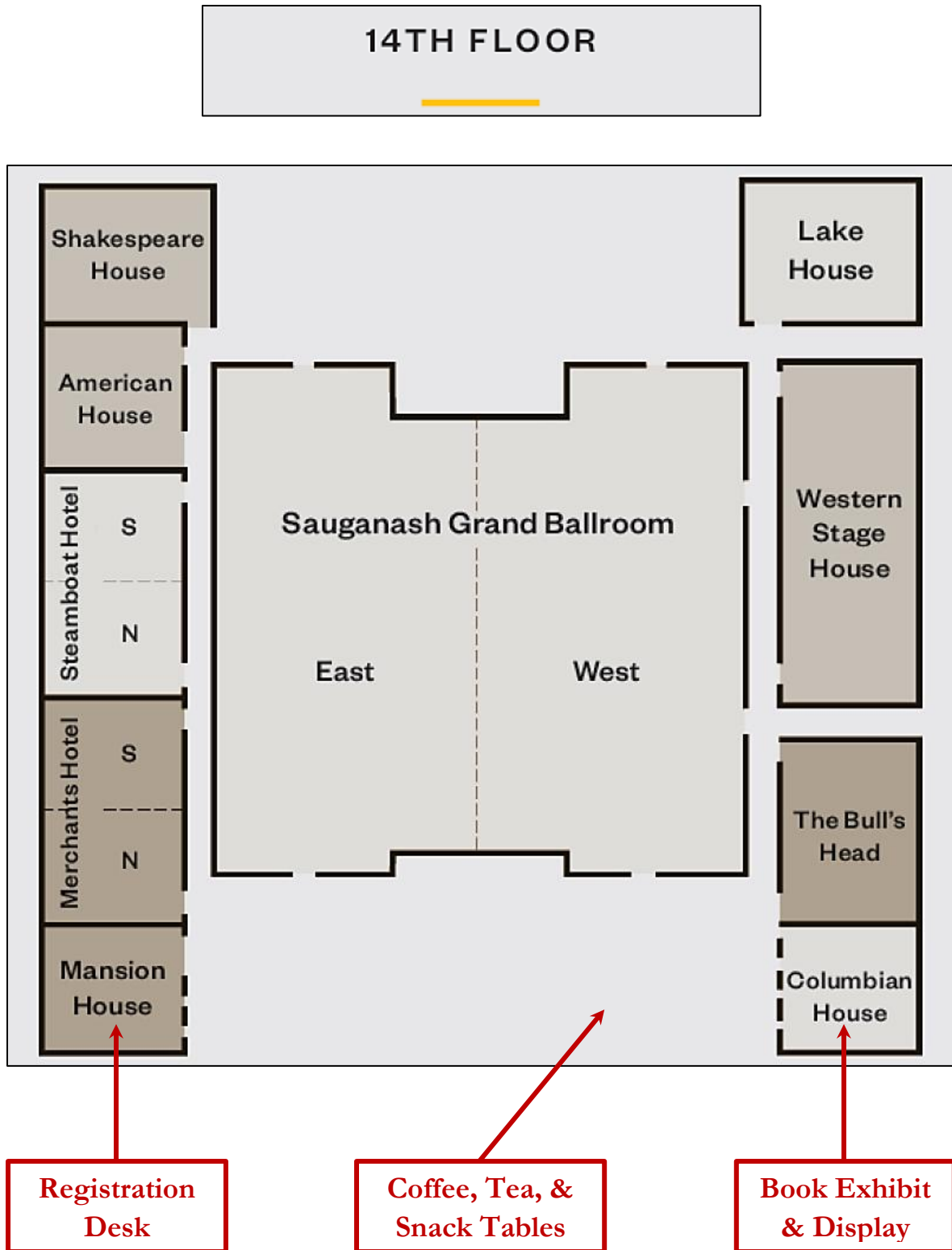

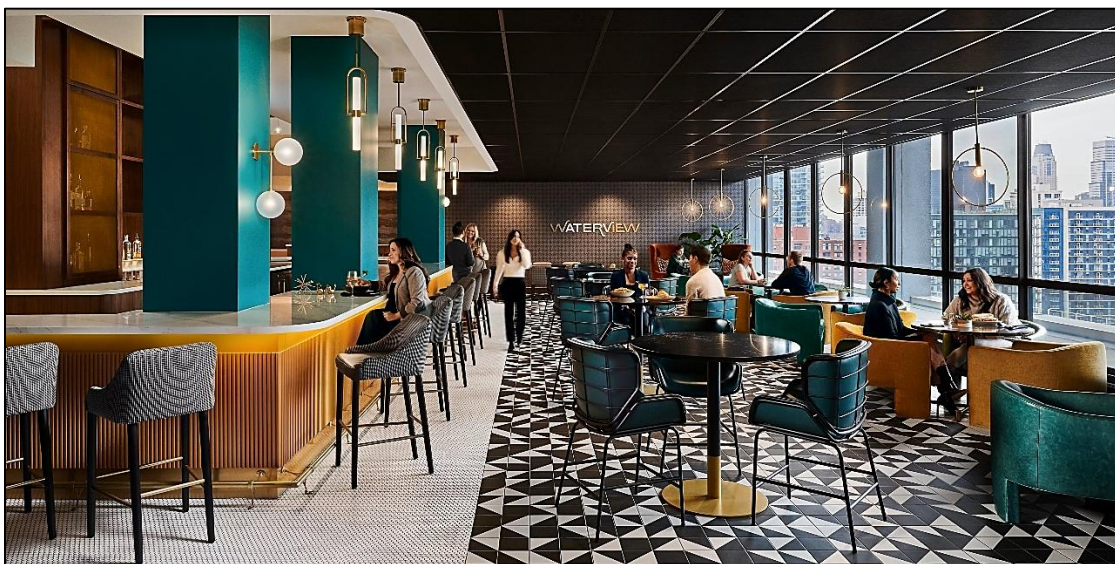

We inhabit a historical moment in which war, genocide, settler colonialism, authoritarianism, ecological collapse, and algorithmic governance converge to reshape memory and political life. In this context, the archive can no longer be understood as a stable repository of history but as a contested terrain, vulnerable to erasure, manipulation, and destruction. Libraries, museums, universities, and cultural repositories have become sites of struggle over historical legitimacy and political power, increasingly transformed into ruins.

This keynote explores what I call the ruins of the archive: fractured material and epistemic spaces in which official regimes of preservation have been damaged, displaced, or rendered incapable of sustaining historical continuity, yet memory persists through alternative forms of transmission. My interest lies precisely in this movement from rupture to other forms of remembrance. I examine how artistic practices, community initiatives, and pedagogy respond to archival destruction by reworking what remains.

To name this process, I propose the concept of *counter-archival poiesis*: the creative, ethical, and relational practice of making new forms of historical relation from the remains of archival violence. Counter-archival poiesis does not seek to reconstruct an intact archive, recover every muted voice, or transform absence into historical certainty. Instead, it makes archival gaps perceptible and places the past in renewed relation to the present and to possible futures.

Focusing on examples from the Global South, I consider contexts in which the destruction of human lives is accompanied by the devastation of educational, cultural, and epistemic infrastructures, exposing the intimate relation between cultural erasure and systems of domination. Within these landscapes of devastation, however, writers, filmmakers, artists, educators, and communities generate counter-archival practices that sustain collective memory, resist epistemic violence, and unsettle dominant regimes of knowledge. Rather than asking simply what remains *after* the archive, this talk asks how memory survives, migrates, and is reconstituted through its ruins. I argue that counter-archival poiesis gives rise to transformative archival forms whose force lies less in the recovery of a lost totality than in the relations they activate across communities and temporalities, opening possibilities for new forms of knowledge, solidarity, ethical responsibility, and decolonial futurity.
