Convention News & Reminders

Undergraduate Student Paper Prize Deadline

If you are an undergraduate student presenting at the Undergraduate Research Symposium at this year's Convention, consider submitting your paper to the Undergraduate Student Paper Prize. A \$100 prize will be awarded to the strongest paper.

• The submission deadline is Monday, November 24th, 2025.

Those who wish to be considered for the Undergraduate Student Paper Prize must submit the following materials to the MMLA at mmla@luc.edu:

- Curriculum Vitae (CV)
- The Presented Paper (3,000-word limit, excluding the Works Cited)

Submissions are reviewed by members of the MMLA's Executive Committee, and the winning paper is announced via email.

Convention Registration

Although the deadline has passed for early-bird pricing, registration for the 2025 Convention is still open on the MMLA member portal, as it is required of all attendees. *If*

you are planning on attending the Convention, you must be registered.

- Registration fees cover costs associated with running the convention, such as A/V equipment, technicians, and Wi-Fi, as well as food and beverage services. To register, you may select either Regular or Special Membership.
 - Regular members include full-time faculty and staff, administrators, school teachers, and librarians.
 - Special members include graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, part-time faculty and staff, as well as independent, unemployed, or retired members.

Review Membership Registration

Non-Member Guest Passes

Guest passes are reserved for *non-MMLA family and friends*. MMLA members may not purchase a guest pass to attend the Convention themselves.

- Pricing: Passes are \$10 per person, per day.
- Hours: Admission covers the hours of 8:00AM-5:30PM (CST) on Friday, Saturday, <u>OR</u> Sunday of the Convention.
